**MEMBERSHIP:** Welcome to St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic Church! We are grateful for your worshipping with us. If you regularly attend Mass here in Maggie Valley, you are encouraged to register in the parish at the office during the week.

**DAILY MORNING AND EVENING PRAYER:** Daily Morning Prayer is at 7:20AM and Daily Evening Prayer is at 5:00 PM are from the Book of Divine Worship. Daily Mass is celebrated at 8:00 AM. Mass on Saturday morning is from the Book of Divine Worship: The Missal. The sermons at daily Mass this week focus on the opening chapters of Genesis.

**BREAKFAST WITH BECKET:** will meet on **Wednesday**, **19 February 2025 at 8:45am** in the Rectory Living Room, continuing with **Leviticus 19: the Laws on Sacrifice.** Why is holiness highlighted as a fundamental quality for the Israelites? How do these laws reflect God's concern for social justice and equality? Why does God specify certain restrictions on agricultural practices and clothing? What lessons can we learn from the guidelines on how to treat the poor and the foreigner?


**BIBLICAL HEBREW:** will meet on **Thursday**, **20 February 2025** at 4:00pm. The lesson will continue with vocabulary study and work on nouns.

**AQUINAS CIRCLE:** will meet on **Tuesday**, **18 February 2025** at 4:00pm with IaIIae. q. 50 (the subject of habits). The subject of anything is the precise reality in which the thing resides or has place. The subject of habits is that precise reality to which habits are properly ascribed. The body has habits, such as health, beauty, fatness, leanness, etc. But body-habits are not perfect habits, for they have not a high degree of stability; they are to some extent readily changeable. Hence body-habits are more properly called *habitual dispositions*, but habits which are exercised by the body have their root in the life principle or soul. This will be the subject for discussion over the next few months.

Theft: Reclaiming the Truth of Who We are in Christ (Deerfield, Illinois: The Gospel Coalition, 2018). Who am I? It's a question we all ask ourselves at some point. Depending on the season we focus our identity on our job performance, marital status, personality type, or social network, among other options. However, there's a larger question to consider. Who does the Bible tell me I am in Christ? we'll seek to answer this question by: Exposing our false notions of identity; Understanding the biblical truth of our identity in Christ; and Reflecting on what it looks like to live

in our new (and true) identity. In 10 chapters we'll cover everything from our identity as children of God to citizens of heaven. At the end of each chapter, study questions will facilitate group discussion as you consider this glorious truth with your friends.
